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Value to Students

Student Success in Secondary

Does the school have full composite program in Grade 9-12?

Lambton-Kent Composite School offers a full complement of courses from Grade 9 through Grade 12. Courses in the various subject areas are offered in a variety of levels of study (Academic, Applied, Open, College, University/College, University, and Workplace). The school also offers specific programming to support student success including Learning Strategies courses, a Co-operative Education program, and a full range of resource services.

Does the school have sufficient numbers of students to run the courses necessary in each subject area for all four student pathways (university, college, apprenticeship and workplace)?

The administration and staff of L.K.C.S. have taken measures in order to ensure they are able to provide complete programming in all subject areas. While all compulsory courses are offered annually, certain elective courses are offered on an alternating year schedule. The Guidance Department assists students with their course planning and course selection process in order to ensure they will have access to these optional courses during their secondary school career. Additionally, L.K.C.S. has leveraged the availability of the Video and E-Learning courses offered by the Lambton Kent District School Board in order to complement its offerings. Tutors and the Student Success teacher provide assistance and support students learning through these formats.

Student Achievement Data including Grades 9 & 10 Mathematics & Literacy results:

Drop out rates:

Of the 387 students who enrolled in Lambton-Kent Composite School in September, 2008:

- 21 non-graduates left the school to pursue an Adult and Continuing Education program.
- 1 non-graduate left the school to pursue employment.

Graduation success rates:

Of the 77 Lambton-Kent Composite School students eligible to graduate in the 2008-2009 school year, 70 students had earned their Ontario Secondary School Diploma by September, 2009 (91% success rate). Of the non-graduates:

- Three students returned to L.K.C.S. to complete the O.S.S.D. requirements.
- One student transferred to T.V.D.S.B. to complete the O.S.S.D. requirements.
- Two students enrolled in an Adult and Continuing Education program.
- One student entered the world of work.

How many courses were cancelled this year? Why?

Lambton-Kent Composite School's course offerings are based on student selections and the Board allotment of sections. Following the timetabling process, under the aforementioned parameters, no classes were cancelled. There were no reductions to the program offered at the school this academic year.

Describe community support partnerships:

Lambton-Kent Composite School is fortunate to benefit from a wide range of community partnerships, some of which are listed below:

- *Service Clubs and Local Businesses* – These organizations provide funds, bursaries, and scholarships to support school activities, extracurricular events, students in need, and school graduates.
- *Local Companies and Businesses* – These establishments assist L.K.C.S. by providing Co-operative Education opportunities to students and experiential learning activities for the *Take Our Kids To Work* program.
- *Dresden and Thamesville Rotary Clubs* – These service groups support the school's *Interact Club*, in addition to providing youth exchange and student leadership conference opportunities.
- *Private Donors* – Donations ranging from building materials to science equipment to used vehicles for educational purposes have been received to support programming.
- *Local Media* – Various local news organizations support the school by printing the *Cardinal Country News* and by covering various school events.
- *Chatham-Kent Women's Centre* – This community resource supports the school by providing counselling services and programming, including the workshops *Dating Shouldn't Hurt*, *Salvaging Sisterhood*, and *Emotions Matter*.
- *Chatham-Kent Public Health Unit* – The school is regularly served by two public health nurses who focus, respectively, on the provision of individual medical service /counselling and group programming.
- *Family Services Kent* – This community support is accessed for specific cases of students in need.
- *Chatham-Kent Mental Health and Addictions Program* – Experts from this community agency support the school in group programming and individual counselling for students.
- *Chatham-Kent Integrated Children's Services* – This community support is accessed for specific cases of students in need.
- *Human Resources Development Canada* – This government-based organization provides an information workshop to assist students in attaining summer employment.
- *Post-Secondary Preparation Programming* – Local University, College, and Apprenticeship experts visit the school to assist students and their families in their post-secondary destination planning.
- *Graduate Exit Programming* – Local agents from the Health Unit, Police Services, and Insurance Industry visit the school to educate students about various issues associated with living independently.

Describe community support/success of the Co-operative Education Program:

Lambton-Kent Composite School employs a full-time Co-operative Education teacher who serves up to 50 students each semester. Approximately 80 local businesses regularly support this program, with many more companies being accessed on occasion in the broader Chatham-Kent community. The co-operation of the business community has been overwhelming, as evidenced by the program instructor who has stated, "I have

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never had a business decline help when approached about a Co-operative Education student placement.” From the L.K.C.S. Co-operative Education program, students have moved directly into employment opportunities, apprenticeship training, and other related post-secondary courses. This program has proven extremely valuable in facilitating student success for a diverse group of students, as reflected by the statistics contained in Appendix IV.

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Partnerships which enhance and support students?

Various programs and partnerships are in place at Lambton-Kent Composite School to enhance our curriculum and support students. These include:

- *Enrichment Programming* – Activities include workshops, seminars, and conferences designed to enhance student interest, aptitude, intellect, and leadership.
- *Student Success Initiatives* – Programs include subject-specific assistance delivered by teachers during and outside of regular classroom hours, a credit support initiative, a credit rescue program, and credit recovery courses.
- *Guest Speaker Series* – Recent topics have ranged from wellness programming (anti-drinking and driving campaigns) to social awareness of world issues (the crisis in Darfur).
- *University Partnership* – A collaboration between L.K.C.S. staff/students and Huron College (University of Western Ontario) focusing on research related to local Black history.
- *R.M. Classic Car Partnership* – A school – business partnership aimed at complementing programming in various disciplines of Technological Education.
- *Cultural Exchanges* – National and international youth exchanges aimed at developing global awareness, tolerance, and personal growth.
- *Alumni Association* – This network supports the school’s academic programming and co-curricular activities by providing financial assistance, mentorship, and youth involvement opportunities. Annual events such as the Men’s Alumni Basketball Game, Women’s Alumni Basketball Game, Alex Hain Memorial Hockey Game, and Alumni Golf Tournament are exceptionally well supported and attended.

Information technology to support the curriculum?

Information systems and technology that are available to support student learning at L.K.C.S. include:

- SMART Technology implementation in the English, French, Mathematics, Science, and Technology departments. An additional SMART-equipped classroom exists for sign-out use by teachers in the other disciplines.

- A school-based initiative presently underway to establish an electronic means of delivering *MarkBook®* progress reports to parents on a regular basis.
- Automated Library system (*Follett*).
- Access to *Knowledge Ontario Databases* for research.
- School-wide use of *easybib.com* and *turnitin.com*, web-based programs aimed at educating students regarding proper documentation and plagiarism avoidance.
- Implementation of *Step 4 Step* and *My Blueprint*, student-oriented career planning programs.
- School-wide access to *Career Cruising*, a career exploration program.

Does your school offer E-learning and/or virtual learning?

Lambton-Kent Composite School offers both online and virtual courses within the 2009-2010 timetable.

How does the culture of the school impact student success?

Lambton-Kent Composite School boasts a small-school, family atmosphere. Because of its size and ingrained culture, staff and administration of the school know the students intimately. The staff is well aware of individual student strengths, weaknesses, and areas of need, and is able to address concerns in a supportive, proactive manner. Furthermore, the family atmosphere of L.K.C.S. reflects the importance of community, a rural value espoused by the students this school serves.

Additional Comments:

A fundamental key to student success is the establishment of a rapport between student and teacher. All staff at Lambton-Kent Composite School provide subject programming at multiple grade levels, permitting situations to arise in which a teacher will work with a student at various points in his/her secondary school career. The knowledge and familiarity gained through these multiple interactions contributes to the school tone and culture of the school, and enhances student achievement.

Enhanced programs: Example – Language Programs

Grades 9-12? Our school has participated in senior French courses with the use of Video conferencing the past four years. This semester, L.K. is offering grade 11 French to L.K. students and those of other rural secondary schools using the video format. Grade 12 French is planned for semester two. Another opportunity for language learning is the exchange opportunities to L.K.C.S. students. These exchanges have included opportunities in Japan and Germany. In addition students participate in organized international trips including trips to France, Italy and the United States.

Specialized Education :

Grades 9-12? L.K.C.S. serves 70 students with IEP's. We have a full time Resource Teacher and a designated resource room equipped with computers, scanners and printers. Students' access resource assistance and the teacher will also work with them in the classrooms. We have participated in Enrichment programming every year to provide opportunities for our gifted students. Our enrichment participation has allowed many students to participate in student exchanges with schools in Saskatchewan and Manitoba.

Effective Intervention programs:

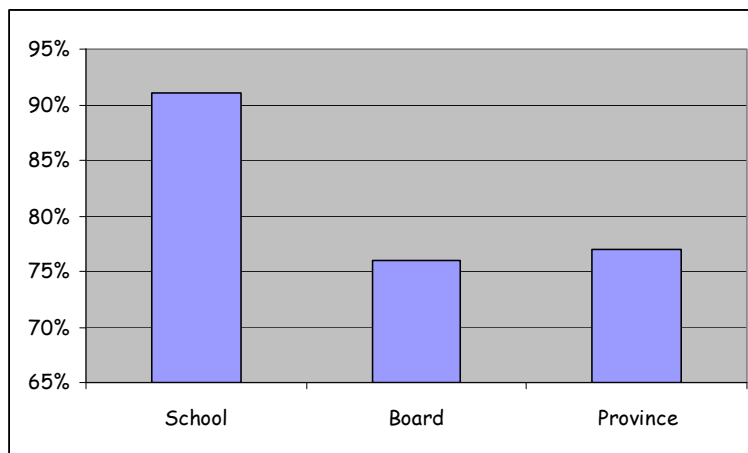
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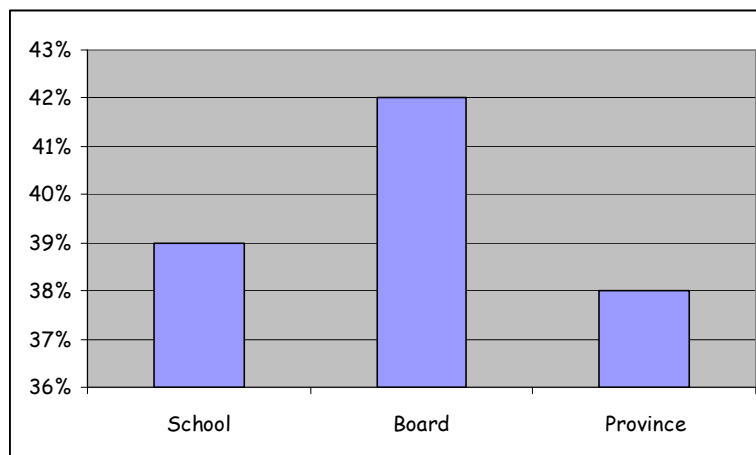

(Levels 3 and 4)



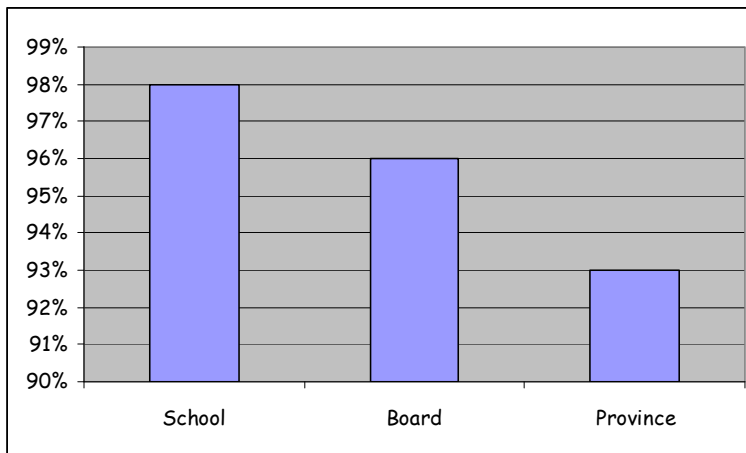
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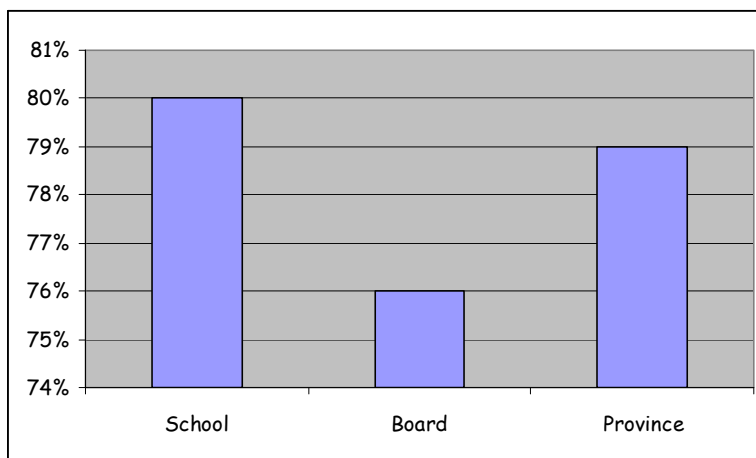

Who Were Successful



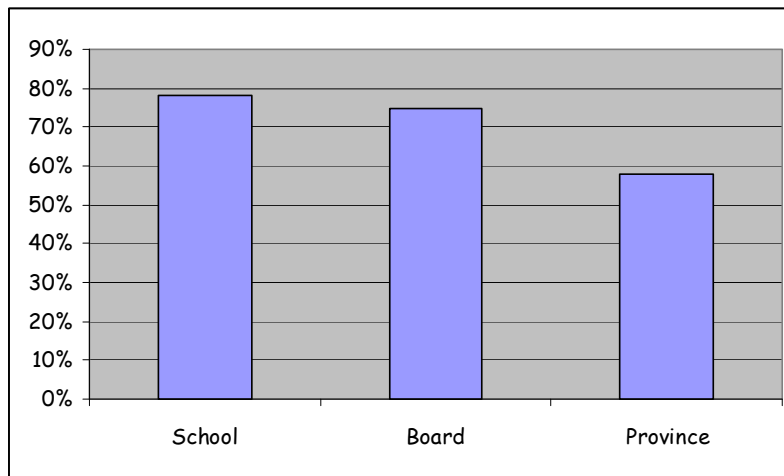
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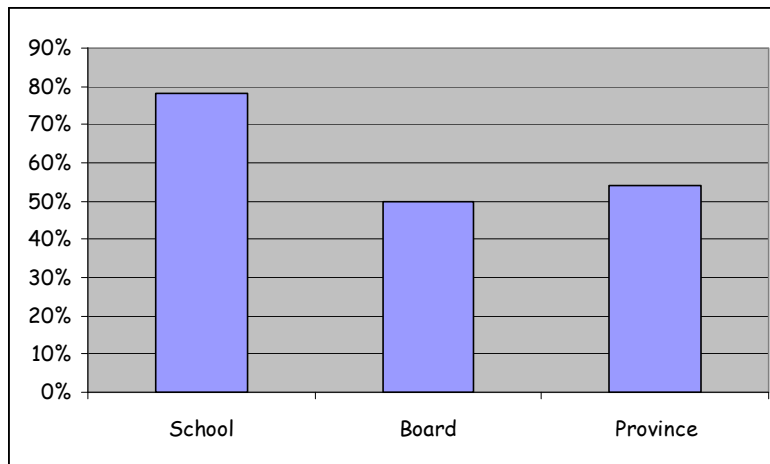
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Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test, 2009
