Associate Director McKay responded that they continue to work through the budget for 2023-2024, and relayed there is loss of \$3.3 million dollars of funding due to the end of the COVID-19 Learning Recovery Fund, a loss of \$1.7 million dollars in Indigenous Education funding, due to a change in funding methodology, and \$4.5 million dollars unfunded for Transportation, due to a new funding formula. He explained that the Transportation funding is shared within the consortium, and the LKDSB's share of the loss is about \$3 million dollars. He remarked that the consortium has always been efficient with a balanced budget. He explained that boards are allowed to provide to the Ministry with a 1% deficit budget amount as part of the approved budget process. He noted that the inability to balance the funding loss without significant costs to the system is a concern. He noted that he is continuing to work through the budget and planned to present the budget at the June 6, 2023 Board Meeting.
