Presentation:	Sandra Perkins introduced Kallie Johnson and Corbin Jacobs, both Grade 10			
Indigenous Peoples	students at WDSS and noted that the indigenous education is an important aspect

	Both students informed the members of SEAC that they are involved in the Future			
	Elders Program; Kallie said her sisters were some of the Program's founders			
	Corbin said that the Future Elders Program brings things into the community and			
	does fundraisers for families on Walpole Island and for other area associations			
	Both students are also involved with the Harriet Jacobs Centre (HJC) which is a			
	student resource and counselling centre that helps students with issues they're			
	having; for example, the HJC can help First Nations students by providing funding			
	for course fees, supplies, transportation, uniform fees, graduation awards, etc.			
	Kallie and Corbin said the HJC Centre was renovated/upgraded in October of 2016			
	and now it's: much more spacious, air-conditioned, and an overall great space for			
	students to go			
	Kallie said students sometimes find it nerve-wracking to leave the Reservation to			
	attend school and so the HJC and Future Elder Program are very beneficial			
	Future Elders and HJC focus on helping the students to be successful			
	Superintendent Lane asked for suggestions on how to ensure that the transition			
	for students coming off the Reservation to attend school is as smooth as possible;			
	Kallie said providing an opportunity for students in Grade 7 and 8 to get to			
	acquainted with staff would be helpful; some work is being done along those			
	lines, just today members of the Future Elders Program attended A.A. Wright			
	today to explain the Program and a bit about the teachings that they've learned, and, there is a First Nations Awareness Committee at A.A. Wright			

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Presentation: Indigenous Peoples and Special Education (continued)	 The Future Elders recently helped to set up a Symposium (with support from the school's Business Studies class); Kallie said that while the Grade 7 & 8 students attended, it might have been helpful to allow other First Nation students from area schools attend a symposium similar to the one that was offered Trustee Hudie asked if students from Walpole Island are able to visit W.D.S.S. when they decide they are going to be going there?; Kallie said that Grade 8s do visit W.D.S.S. and it is helpful 	
	 Angie asked about the main reason students visit the HJC?; Kallie said it's an amazing part of the school that's not limited to use by only First Nation students, and the counsellors are easy to talk to Anika said the definition of First Nations is for those individuals/families living on a reserve; the Walpole Island Reserve has limited land capacity causing residents to move; currently about 60% of (former) residents no longer live on the Reserve Anika suggested that, if the Board wants to look at achievement for the entire indigenous population, the definition needs to be broadened 	
Update on Implementation and Use of Community Living Sarnia- Lambton's jobPath Toolkit	 Bruce reminded the members that a presentation had been made by representatives from Community Living Sarnia-Lambton about a year ago regarding the 'JobStart Toolkit', which is now called the jobPath Toolkit Bruce informed SEAC that the Board purchased 4 Toolkits: AMSS (one for the ALLP class and one for the ABLE class), JMSS (for the ABLE class) and GLSS (for the ALLP class) Bruce said that the Toolkits were developed for use by adults so they aren't ideal for high school-aged students therefore they've received mixed reviews from the ABLE and ALLP classroom teachers The Board has black line masters that provide opportunities for a Q & A session, role playing, etc. Because of the amount of technology utilized by the Board teachers are looking for interactive digitized versions of the information Bruce will meet with Community Living Sarnia Lambton representatives to focus on making suggestions for improvement Until such time as the Toolkits are more technology-friendly additional copies (for the remaining secondary schools) won't be purchased The Toolkits have been beneficial but the ALLP Co-op Classes are required to follow the regular Co-op program that includes WHMIS. Health and Safety, etc. 	
Development of an Accessibility Standard for Education under the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act	 follow the regular Co-op program that includes WHMIS, Health and Safety, etc. Superintendent Barrese informed SEAC that The Ministry of Education, in support of the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA), is soliciting input on the potential scope of the Education Standard Development Committee (ESDC), that will be established in the Fall The ESDC will develop an accessibility standard for education Work has been done to support an inclusive education system for students and staff and visitors to the Lambton Kent District School Board To further these efforts, the Ministry of Education is looking to engage educators, families and community members in the process of developing an accessibility standard for education through an online survey An email will be forwarded to members for their information and action 	All Lori

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Future Updates to Field Trip Procedure/ Regulations/Forms	 Superintendent Barrese informed the members that a parent of a student in one of our schools expressed concerns about the accessibility of field trips The Senior Administrative Team worked together to update the Procedure/Regulations/Forms; the revised documents were provided to the members for their input/feedback Angie advised the members that the Senior Administrative Team didn't change any wording already in the documents, they only added new sections/wording Dawn asked who an 'eligible' student is?; Angie explained they are taking into consideration the entire student body from which participants can attend versus who will attend; it is meant to be inclusive language Jack said that under Section 2.0 he would like the wording to be stronger; Angie said that it's meant to identify something that might happen that had not been anticipated (i.e. the class goes to a theatre to see a play; the theatre is accessible because there's an elevator but, on the day that the class is there, the elevator is broken); Jack feels that one of the accommodations that would need to be made is the field trip itself if the field trip is not going to be accessible to everyone, then it should not proceed Elizabeth said it's important for parents to be up front about anything that could potentially cause a problem (i.e. fear, car sickness, etc.); Angie informed the members that the Senior Administrative Team was planning to add an additional section where parents would have to sign off to indicate that they had made the school aware of any issues that they should know about so accommodations could be made, if necessary Anika said that there is a liability waiver on the international field trip form and she's wondering if it's not necessary to be included on the regular waiver?; Angie will look into that Dawn asked whether, if accommodations require extra support, the school provide that or whether it would it be up to the par	• All
